<u>A Woman in Jerusalem</u> by A. B. Yehoshua. 237 pages, published in 2003. A non-Jewish woman, identifiable only by a pay stub, who has worked in a prominent bakery, is found dead. The head of Human Resources in the bakery is tasked with finding out who she is and what happened to her in order to counter a story about to be published by an investigative reporter. Mitla Pass by **Leon Uris**, xxx pages, published 1989. It is a novel about a strategically important battle and location near the Suez Canal. It is timely from a national security and international affairs standpoint because of the location (Suez, Hormuz, Baltics, Malacca are key chokepoints of global trade; viewed surgically, Israel is important because it is in weapons range of Suez). Like the Boats of Cherbourg, this book thus would be of great timely interest now, given the unfortunate rise in violence, especially to those members of the book club who hope to serve humanity in diplomatic careers, or who simply hope for a more peaceful world. The Fixer by Bernard Malamud 276 pages, first published in 1976. The Mystics of Mile End by Sigal Samuel. 292 pages, published 2015. The first novel by a prolific, award-winning fiction writer, journalist, and playwright. Set in the Mile End area of Montreal, Canada – mixed neighborhood of Hasidism and Hippies/New Age types, the novel is narrated in turn by an 11-1/2 y.o. boy; his widowed classics professor father, and his 20-something lesbian, lapsed Jewish sister. In a humorous, empathic, aphoristic manner, this book covers family issues as the characters cope with the "mysticism" of Kabbalah, an issue resolved in the fourth chapter. \$14.95 paper, \$8.90 Kindle. The People of the Book by **Gertrude Himmlefarb** (not to be confused with Geraldine Brooks' same-titled novel which we read a few years ago.) 155 pages, published 2021 Written by one of the chief Jewish cultural historian intellectuals of America, an expert on Victorian England, the book is subtitled "Philosemitism in England, from Cromwell to Churchill." The author sets out to correct the one-sided antisemitic and sad view of Jewish history by presenting surprisingly rich philosemitic literature, principles, and policies "that have made modern England a model of liberality and civility."
